TNReady Achievement: student score provides a raw score that is used to calculate course grade for report cards [<i>currently 15% of 2nd semester grades (grades 3-5) & 15% of 2nd semester grades (grades 6-8)</i>] Test results are used in teacher, school and district accountability with the State of Tennessee and the Federal Government.
